THE MONASTERY OF ST. BERNARD DE CLAIRVAUX HOME OF THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR GRAND PRIORY OF AMERICA

L'Ordre du Temple de Jerusalem is headed by our Grand Master, Brigadier General Ronald S. Mangum and its Grand Priory of The United States is headed by Grand Prior Caesar Johnson (Knights Templar Grand Priory of America).

Grand Prior Johnson has announced the Monastery as the new home of our Order in the United States and we are pleased to host our Grand Master here for the dedication at our National Conclave.


The building of the Monastery of St. Bernard de Clairvaux began in Sacramenia, Spain, in the year 1133, nearly 360 years before Columbus set sail for the New World. Completed in 1141 AD, the Monastery was originally dedicated to the Virgin Mary and named "The Monastery of Our Lady, Queen of the Angels." Upon canonization of the famous Cistercian monk, Bernard of Clairvaux, the Monastery was renamed in his honor.



Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153) may well represent the most important figure in Templarism. Bernard was pivotal in the planning, formation and promotion of Templar Order.

There is no doubt that he was blood-tied to some of the first Templar Knights, in particular Andre de Montbard, who was his maternal uncle. He may also have been related to the Counts of Champagne, who themselves appear to have been instrumental in the formation of the Templar Order.

For whatever reason St Bernard wrote the first 'rules' of the Templar Order. He may have undertaken this task personally and they were based, almost entirely, on the Order adopted by the Cistercians themselves. The Templars were officially declared to be a monastic order under the protection of Church in Troyes in 1139. It is a fact that the Templars venerated St Bernard from that moment on. St Bernard's influence on the Templars' aims and objectives cannot be underestimated.



Cistercian monks occupied the monastery for nearly 700 years. After a social revolution in the 1830's, the cloisters were seized, sold, and converted into a granary and stable.

In 1925, William Randolph Hearst purchased the Cloisters and the Monastery's outbuildings. The structures were dismantled stone by stone, bound with protective hay, packed in some 11,000 wooden crates, numbered for identification and shipped to the United States.

About that time, hoof and mouth disease broke out in Segovia, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, fearing possible contagion, quarantined the shipment upon its arrival, broke open the crates and burned the hay, a possible carrier of the disease. Unfortunately, the workmen failed to replace the stones in the same numbered boxes before moving them to a warehouse.

Soon after the shipment arrived, Hearst's financial problems forced most of his collection to be sold at auction.

The stones remained in a warehouse in Brooklyn, New York, for 26 years. One year after Hearst's' death in 1952, they were purchased by Messrs. W. Edgemon and R. Moss for use as a tourist attraction.

It took 19 months and almost \$1.5 million dollars (over 13 million dollars in today's currency) to put the Cloisters back together in what Time magazine called the 'world's biggest jigsaw puzzle'.

In 1964, due to financial difficulties, the Cloisters



were put up for sale. Col. Robert Pentland, Jr, a multimillionaire banker, philanthropist and benefactor of many Episcopal churches, purchased the Cloisters for the parish.

Today the Church of St. Bernard de Clairvaux remains an active Episcopal congregation (over 1,200 members) in the diocese as well as a popular site for weddings, quinces, and other special events.

The Capital District's Chaplain, Father Gregory Mansfield, KTJ is the Rector of the Parish and Executive Director/CEO of the Museum. Each year, over 125,000 tourists and pilgrims from all over the world come to visit the Monastery and its gardens.

THE RECYCLE SHOE PROJECT

We invite you to bring a pair of old worn shoes in all sizes. The shoes will be donated to the Recycle Shoe Project.

Recycle Shoe Project is a social movement to collect and upcycle old worn shoes while raising money for various schools, charities, and organizations like the Monastery.

- While we reduce our carbon footprint by keeping shoes out of landfills (where they take 30 to 40 years to decompose) we:
 - Improves quality of life
 - More than 70 percent of the world's population uses secondhand shoes.
- Recycled textiles are also used to produce cleaning products, insulation, upholstery, mattresses and more.
- According to the U.S. Department of the Interior, Americans throw away at least 360 million pairs of shoes each year, where they can take 30 – 40 years to decompose.
- Millions of unwanted shoes are destroyed in ways that do not benefit the environment or are not socially responsible.
- Of the 24.2 billion pairs of shoes manufactured globally each year, experts say that most of them end up in a landfill or incinerator, because there are simply too many shoes and not enough recycling solutions.
- This project models a circular economy, which is "a model of production and consumption, which involves sharing, leasing, reusing, repairing, refurbishing and recycling existing materials and products as long as possible" that aims at tackling global challenges like climate change, biodiversity loss, waste, and pollution.
